




Application:

Bible Study Lesson: Everyday Jesus - Don't Forget to Remember

Sermon 1: Don't Be Afraid of What They Call You

Scripture References:

- -Matthew 5:11-12 (NIV): "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."
- 1 Peter 4:14 (NLT): "If you are insulted because you bear the name of Christ, you will be blessed, for the glorious Spirit of God rests upon you."

Exegesis:

1. Matthew 5:11-12:

- Context: This passage is part of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, specifically the Beatitudes, which outline the blessings associated with Kingdom living.
 - Key Points:
- Blessed: Jesus redefines what it means to be blessed, associating it with being persecuted for righteousness and for His sake.

- Scriptural Affirmations: Use verses such as John 1:12, Romans 8:16-17, and 1 John 3:1 to remind yourself of your true identity.

2. Responding to Insults:

- Rejoice and Be Glad: Adopt a mindset of joy, knowing that enduring insults and persecution for Christ places you in esteemed company with the prophets and early Christians. - Community Support: Engage with your church community for encouragement and support. Share experiences and build each other up in faith.

3. Biblical Examples:

- Joseph: Despite being called a dreamer and falsely accused, he rose to prominence (Genesis 37-50).
- -David: Labeled as just a shepherd boy, he became a king (1 Samuel 16-17).
- Jesus: Called a blasphemer and ultimately crucified, yet He rose again and reigns as King of Kings.

4. Practical Steps:


- Daily Affirmations: Start your day with affirmations from Scripture, reminding yourself of God's truths about you.

EVERYDAY 15 to the Christ:

Sermon: Time Past, Present, and Future in Christ:

The Power of Suffering Series: #EverydayJesus

Scripture: 1 Peter 4:1-6 NLT

Introduction

In our #EverydayJesus series, we've been exploring how our faith impacts every part of our lives. Today, we turn to 1 Peter 4:1-6, where Peter reminds us that our past, present, and future are deeply connected to Christ's suffering and our own. As we reflect on this passage, we'll also explore a profound truth: our suffering for Christ not only aligns us with His will but also repays the debt of sin, allowing us to walk in newness of life.

Exegesis of 1 Peter 4:1-6

Verse 1:

"So then, since Christ suffered physical pain, you must arm yourselves with the same attitude he had, and be ready to suffer, too. For if you have suffered physically for Christ, you have finished with sin."

Peter begins by drawing a direct connection between Christ's suffering and ours. Christ's suffering was purposeful—it was for our salvation. When we suffer for Christ, we share in His suffering, and it has a purifying effect on us. Peter suggests that suffering helps us break away from sin, indicating that it has a redemptive purpose in our lives. By enduring suffering for Christ's sake, we repay the debt of sin by refusing to return to our old ways, thus finishing with sin.

Verse 2:

"You won't spend the rest of your lives chasing your own desires, but you will be anxious to do the will of God."

Our present is transformed by our decision to follow Christ. In the past, we chased after our desires, but now, after coming to faith, we are called to pursue God's will. This verse highlights the transition from a life dominated by sin to one driven by the desire to please God. Our suffering for Christ keeps us focused on what truly matters—God's will rather than our own desires.

Verses 3-4:

"You have had enough in the past of the evil things that godless people enjoy—their immorality and lust, their feasting and drunkenness and wild parties, and their terrible worship of idols. Of course, your former friends are surprised when you no longer plunge into the flood of wild and destructive things they do. So they slander you."

Peter reminds us of the futility of our past sins. We've had enough of that life; it's time to move forward. Our transformation in Christ leads to a break from our past, and this often results in misunderstandings and slander from those who continue in sin. This is where suffering for Christ comes into play. When we endure slander and rejection for Christ, we are, in a way, repaying the debt of sin by choosing to stay faithful to Him rather than returning to our past life.

Verses 5-6:

"But remember that they will have to face God, who stands ready to judge everyone, both the living and the dead. That is why the Good News was preached to those who are now dead—so although they were destined to die like all people, they now live forever with God in the Spirit."

Peter concludes by pointing us toward the future. God's judgment is inevitable, and everyone will face it. But for those who have accepted the Gospel, even death is not the end; they live forever with God in the Spirit. This eternal perspective should guide how we live now. Our suffering is temporary, but it prepares us for an eternity with God. By enduring suffering and turning away from sin, we acknowledge that the debt has been paid in full by Christ, and we now live for Him.

Practical Life Application

1. **Embrace Suffering as a Means to End Sin (Past):**
Recognize that suffering for Christ has a purpose. It helps to sever ties with past sins. Reflect on how Christ's suffering paid the ultimate debt of sin, and view your suffering as a way to turn away from sin and align more closely with God's will.

2. **Live in the Present with a New Purpose:**

Shift your focus from your desires to God's will. Your past life of sin is over, and now you live to please God. Engage in practices that keep you in step with God's will, such as prayer, Scripture reading, and serving others, knowing that your present sufferings are shaping you into Christ's image.

3. **Look to the Future with Confidence:**

The future holds the promise of eternal life with God. Let this assurance strengthen you in times of suffering. Every challenge you endure for Christ is preparing you for an eternity with Him. The debt of sin is fully paid, and your suffering only confirms your commitment to live for Christ now and forever.

4. **Respond to Persecution with Grace:**

When people slander or persecute you for your faith, remember that this suffering is part of your journey with Christ. Rather than retaliating, respond with grace, knowing that God is the ultimate judge and that your suffering has eternal significance.

Closing

In Christ, our past sins are forgiven, our present is filled with purpose, and our future is secure. Suffering for Christ is not in vain—it is a powerful way of repaying the debt of sin by choosing to live righteously in the present. Let us embrace suffering, not as a burden, but as a privilege, knowing that it aligns us with Christ and prepares us for eternity. This is what it means to live out #EverydayJesus.

Bible Study Lesson: *Suffering, Sin, and Eternal Life*
Scripture Focus: 1 Peter 4:1-6 NLT

Closing Prayer:

Help us to see our own suffering as a means to grow closer to You and to break free from the chains of past sins. May we live each day with a renewed purpose, seeking to do Your will, and looking forward to the promise of eternal life. Strengthen us to endure, knowing that our suffering is not in vain but is part of our journey with You. In Jesus' name, Amen."

TEXT: REVELATION 21:1-4, HEBREWS 13:8

INTRODUCTION:

- REFLECT ON HOW THIS HOPE SUSTAINS US THROUGH TRIALS AND CHALLENGES, KNOWING THAT OUR FUTURE IS SECURE IN CHRIST.
- 3. **LIVING IN LIGHT OF ETERNITY:**
- 1 JOHN 3:2-3 ENCOURAGES US TO LIVE PURE AND HOLY LIVES AS WE ANTICIPATE JESUS' RETURN. OUR FUTURE HOPE MOTIVATES US TO LIVE RIGHTEOUSLY IN THE PRESENT.
- CONSIDER HOW THE ASSURANCE OF ETERNITY WITH JESUS SHAPES OUR VALUES, PRIORITIES, AND ACTIONS TODAY.
- **APPLICATION:**
- HOLD ON TO THE HOPE OF ETERNITY WITH JESUS. LET THIS HOPE ANCHOR YOUR SOUL AND GIVE YOU STRENGTH TO PERSEVERE.
- LIVE WITH AN ETERNAL PERSPECTIVE, MAKING CHOICES THAT REFLECT YOUR FUTURE WITH CHRIST.
- **CONCLUSION:**

OUR JOURNEY THROUGH ETERNITY PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE REVEALS THE UNCHANGING NATURE OF JESUS. HE IS THE SAME YESTERDAY, TODAY, AND FOREVER. THIS TRUTH FILLS US WITH FAITH, HOPE, AND ASSURANCE AS WE NAVIGATE LIFE'S JOURNEY, KNOWING THAT OUR ETERNAL GOD IS WITH US EVERY STEP OF THE WAY.



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Sermon Series: Everyday Jesus - Don't Forget to Remember Sermon 1: Don't Be Afraid of What They Call You

Scripture References:

Yes, what He's doing for me tomorrow is important. But what God is doing for you right now, that's important. Can you just praise Him right now for being the God of today? Just the God of this moment, can you just praise Him for being the God of this moment?"
